Section 1: Introduction

Aliaxis is pleased to submit this Modern Slavery Statement for the reporting period of 1 January 2023 - 31 December 2023.

The content of this Statement is focussed on the Aliaxis Operations within Australia and New Zealand. This Statement also meets the requirements of Vinidex Pty Limited as a reporting entity for the purposes of the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Commonwealth). This Statement describes the actions taken and planned during the reporting period to assess and address any modern slavery risks in our operations and supply chain.

Aliaxis opposes slavery in all its forms. Aliaxis is committed to identifying and preventing any potential modern slavery risks within our operations and supply chains.

Aliaxis Operations in Australia and New Zealand rely on a network of over 2000 active tier one suppliers. Among these, 93% are locally based within Australia or New Zealand, where possible, we strive to support local businesses near our sites. Our supply chains span more than 30 origin countries, including strategically partnering with international suppliers for critical raw materials, manufacturing equipment and specialised finished goods.

Additionally, Aliaxis maintains intercompany supply chains. The majority of our intercompany spending occurs within the Aliaxis ANZ business, while transactions also extend to Aliaxis Europe and Aliaxis North America.



Identified Potential Modern Slavery Risks

After reviewing our over 2000 active suppliers, we have identified the following potential risks of Modern Slavery Practices within our supply chains.

Domestic Geographic Risks	By count, 93% of our active tier one suppliers are also based in Australia and New Zealand. Although always a potential risk, the Modern Slavery Index confirms low prevalence, low vulnerability, and low percentages of both Australian and New Zealand's populations as potentially living in Modern Slavery.
International Geographic Risks	Although the minority of our tier one and tier two suppliers are based internationally, together they make up a significant portion of our total spend. We have identified over 30 origin countries within our supply chains. We have assessed the varying geographic risks for each known origin country utilising data from "The Modern Slavery Index" published by the Walk Free Foundation. Over 84% of our spend was with Low-Risk countries, including Australia and New Zealand. All higher risk country sourcing is prioritised for deeper Risk Assessment, including our Modern Slavery Survey's and our Supply Chain Investigations.
Industry and Sector Specific Risks	Our taxonomy classifies our spend into 23 tier one industries. We identified 5 of these industries as having higher potential Modern Slavery Risks, based on findings from the "Global Slavery Index" now published by the Walk Free Foundation. • Facilities Management • Factory Consumables • Human Resources • IT & Telecom • Professional Services
Product and Service Specific Risks	Our taxonomy classifies our spend into 129 tier two product and service types. Of these we identified 8 relevant spend categories as having higher potential Modern Slavery risks based on Guidance from the Department of Home Affairs. Supplier Specific Risks	We also acknowledge there are entity specific risks which our suppliers have the responsibility to manage through corporate governance, legal compliance, and effective risk management. Where warranted, we validate our Supplier Specific Risk levels by assessing their Modern Slavery Statements or using our Self-Assessment Survey.

Section 6: Actions Taken to Assess and Address Modern Slavery Risks




Our 2023 Modern Slavery Risk Assessment process included the following actions.

Procurement	Our Procurement Playbook, as our internal guide for undertaking Procurement activities within Aliaxis ANZ, continues to be utilized and updated. It details process requirements across sourcing and conducting supplier modern slavery risk assessments.
Playbook	Case Study: Proactive Risk Assessment
	A distributor introduced a Titanium Dioxide product for trialling. Drawing from our Procurement Playbook, which outlines country-specific risks, the producer was proactively assessed, an informed decision was made and the trials of the product from this producer were discontinued.
Desktop Risk Analysis	 We conduct an annual Desktop Risk Analysis, including all active suppliers within our Aliaxis ANZ supply chains. External Modern Slavery data from The Modern Slavery Index and local governments provides an objective and evidence-based methodology to calculate risks for greater focus and prioritization. Data is further enriched by our stakeholders. Supplier Statement Reviews	Of our active suppliers in CY 2023, we identified 246 who published Modern Slavery Statements into the Australian Register. We also identified 69 suppliers who published Modern Slavery Statements in the UK Register, instead of or in addition to those in the Australian Register. Where warranted by risk level, supplier Statements were reviewed.
Modern Slavery Survey	Our Supplier Sustainability Self-Assessment Survey is focussed on assessing Modern Slavery risks in our extended supply chains. Our Survey was sent to over 220 suppliers in 2023. Recipients were prioritised based on their desktop risk assessment levels. Modern Slavery Risk Management Actions



After identifying our potential Modern Slavery risks, we developed a Modern Slavery Risk Management Action Plan. Below is an overview of our actions within 2023.

Collaboration

This included review of their past responses to assess year-on-year progress. When we identified potentially elevated risk levels, we conducted thorough assessments and validations. Furthermore, we actively communicated our own statements and insights.

Case Study: Sourcing Process

Where suppliers respond to our Self-Assessment Questionnaire (SAQ) with 'Work in Progress,' we monitor for improvement year on year. Concerned about a supplier's responses to a critical question, follow-up actions were initiated, including seeking acknowledgment of our Supplier Code of Conduct (SCOC). Instead of directly addressing our requests, the supplier submitted an extensive sustainability report, which unfortunately inadequately addressed our concerns related to Human Rights.


Management recognized the issue and demanded a definitive resolution. Consequently, an overseas supplier meeting was convened at the supplier's regional headquarters, with a strong emphasis on Human Rights. Representatives from both the Distributor and Producer were present. The outcome: formal SCOC acknowledgment and enhanced clarity regarding the 'Work in Progress' response. Additionally, adjustments were made

- As a Globally led activity, our Employee Employee Code of Code of Ethics was updated and relaunched, supported by mandatory Ethics online training for all staff.
- We actively collaborate with our suppliers to seek their acknowledgement of our Supplier Code of Conduct. In 2023, we Supplier established an ambitious goal of Code of Conduct achieving an ongoing 80% regional acknowledgements spend coverage, a 10% increase from the previous year. By year-end, we not (SCOC) only exceeded this target but also proactively targeted those suppliers with inherent Modern Slavery risk, irrespective of their spending levels.

After successfully launching the Modern Slavery Awareness Module and implementing the SCOC training in 2022, we partnered with HR to establish **Risk Training** a robust system for ongoing monitoring of new starters and role changes. This has ensured consistent oversight of training requirements and progress, with regular reporting.

With the 2022 Global Framework for Trade Compliance in place, robust processes and procedures were established across the APAC region in Trade Compliance 2023. As a result, all suppliers are now and Adverse Media subject to continuous monitoring for trade compliance risk. Furthermore, they undergo additional scrutiny to detect any adverse media associations.







Action Effectiveness, Consultations, and Approval



Section 7: Assessing the Effectiveness of the Actions

The following is in place to assess the effectiveness of our Modern Slavery framework.

Program Reviews	Aliaxis undertakes regular reviews of our Risk Management Program, providing updates within weekly meeting forums. This includes assessing our progress against action items and the impact those actions have made. We utilise year-on-year data to assess the progress of ourselves and our suppliers.
Executive Management Governance	Our Aliaxis Asia Pacific Executive Team, Global Procurement Director, and Global Sustainability Director are regularly updated on our Modern Slavery initiatives. This process is led by our Asia Pacific Procurement Director and Procurement team.
Ongoing internal and external feedback	We have ongoing supplier engagement and communication plans throughout our Risk Assessment and Risk Management processes. We receive customer feedback following support of their Risk Assessment and Survey processes. We also engage with our Global Aliaxis colleagues, including in Aliaxis UK who are subject to their own local legislative modern slavery risk management requirements.
Whistleblowing	Aliaxis operates a global alert channel empowering our employees to raise an alert if they believe that something may not align with the purpose and behaviours we strive to achieve every day, such as any suspected violations of laws and regulations, our Code of Ethics or other group policies. In 2023, we did not receive any report containing allegations of modern slavery or child labour related to the operations of Aliaxis Australia and New Zealand or their suppliers.

Section 8: Our Consultation Process

Consultation with Reporting Entities

During the development of this Modern Slavery Statement for CY 2023, we actively engaged and consulted with all our Aliaxis owned operations within Australia and New Zealand.
